Culture at your convenience

A striking façade Originally built in 1889 as a gentlemen's club, the majestic Franco-Flemish-style building features an ornate exterior of red brick and stone adorned with Ionic columns and topped with turrets. Step into the entrance hall and you'll be greeted by a marble staircase and a bespoke glass chandelier crafted by Czech lighting brand Lasvit.

Classic elegance

The story so far

Formerly The Foreign Correspondents' Club (FCC), the hotel still retains the distinct lines and shapes of British architect Gary Fell's designs, even after the latest renovation led by interior designer Malee Whitcraft. Reopened as the FCC Angkor in July, it showcases a refreshing style that blends Scandinavian-chic and muted colours alongside Khmer artistry and detailing.

Jungle oasis

Across the building's iterations, property designers have shared the same



reverence for nature, building around century-old trees and adding pocket gardens. Bask by an in-ground saltwater lap pool under canopies of mango, banyan and tamarind trees, or enjoy a soothing view framed by banana trees, night jasmine and palms.

Cocktail culture

Beloved within the hotel is Scribe, a gorgeous alfresco lounge with a square-shaped bar and spread-out seating under the wave of gentle trees, where you can sip on refreshing tipples made using the locally distilled Seekers Mekong Dry Gin.
